





²²You were taught, with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; ²³ to be made new in the attitude of your minds; ²⁴ and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness.

Let's Practice!

Help these parents provide a "way of escape" for their children using the Positive Conclusion to form an intervention plan.

- 1. Identify the sins that need to be put off.

- 2. Provide insight to the sins identified above. Tip: Use the Bible to help get to the bottom of the issue
- 3. Plan out practical age-appropriate solutions to help these families put on godly responses to their struggles.

Case 1

It's incredibly difficult to get my 6 YO son going in the morning. He is very independent and wants to do things on his terms, which is wonderful, but we have to be at school at a certain time. He gets plenty of sleep (about 11 hours). He wakes up with a little grumbling (I do too, haha), but then refuses to get dressed. When we convince him to get dressed, he then doesn't want to brush his teeth, pee, eat breakfast, etc. He is often running out the door at the last minute, with shoes and breakfast in his hand, because he just doesn't want to get moving in the morning. Sometimes we are late because of it.



Last year, he was in kindergarten and there was no real school consequence to him when he was late. This year, if he is late too often, he will miss out on field trips or fun class activities. Aside from not wanting him to miss out on fun school events, I just don't want to feel like I am a drill sergeant in the morning.

He gets frustrated at me and tells me I am "bad" or he doesn't like me. I have given him a space to talk to me about why he says those things/feels that way, but he always tells me that he doesn't know why outside of being frustrated, he doesn't actually think I am a bad mama. When he says those things, I know he is just taking out his frustration on me because I am a safe person to do it with, but it makes me sad and just starts the morning off in a rocky way.

How can I help the morning go smoothly? How can I gently relay to him that we have a schedule to keep and that we have to be prepared to get up and go?

I know it will be asked, so I will confirm that we have tried an earlier bedtime, a later bedtime, and earlier wake up time, a later wake up time, ...any combo of those things. He LOVES school and everything there is to do with learning, so I know that this struggle has nothing to do with the desire to be there.

Case 2

My 13-year-old girl has been struggling with her self-image lately. She wants to look exactly like the models in her magazines and bursts into tears when she wakes up in the morning and looks in the mirror. She hates that she has "fat thighs" and a "zit face" to use her words, when really, she doesn't have such large legs and I have seen girls with much more acne than she will ever have.

She has younger siblings that have not yet experienced the changes she has gone through, and sometimes they tease her on her worse acne days and when she is feeling down.

What should I say to her to tell her that she is beautiful inside and out and that her thighs and one pimple doesn't change that?

One Last Encouragement: Complaint of the Perfect Parent
